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Student Nurses as Modern Digital Nomads: Developing Nursing Skills Competence and Confidence through Video-Based Learning

Abstract

The skill competency of the nursing staff relates to healthcare outcomes. Preparing graduates to provide safe, high-quality nursing care is the foundation of any nursing education. Indeed, the COVID-19 pandemic has changed nursing education with the implementation of new pedagogical techniques such as blended learning. The purpose of this study is to assess the efficacy of video-based training in determining students' performance and levels of confidence in selected nursing procedures. It also attempts to explore the elements that influence the performance and confidence of nursing students. This research utilized a quasi-experimental design. This survey included a total of 44 students enrolled in the nursing diploma program. Using quota selection, the researcher split the students into two groups. The control group received face-to-face instruction in the laboratory. For the study group, the students recorded and uploaded three films of the steps via the Blackboard platform. At various demonstration periods, the study group outperformed the control group significantly. Students in the study group performed better at hand washing in the first and second trials, as well as in the final evaluation, compared to those in the control group. The conclusion of this study was that student motivation and participation can improve learning results. This combination of web-based training with audio-visual material has many advantages. The mean self-confidence score of the study group is substantially greater than that of the control group. This example demonstrates how audiovisual materials can be used to teach various nursing topics

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Application of efforts to improve the quality of life in autoimmune disorder: Reframing its definition

Abstract

Palliative care is a special type of medical care. It's designed to improve the quality of life of patients with a serious or terminal progressive disease, through global and multidisciplinary care. The notion of quality of life is multidimensional and unique to each individual patient, making them key players in their own care.

The World Health Organization definition as "an individual's perception of their position in life in the context of culture (family and society) and value system in which they live and in relation to their goals, expectations, standards and concerns" is more fitting. Patel P., etal (2020), in their study have shown that given the increasing incidence of chronic illness, the role of palliative care, including its availability earlier in the course of an illness, will become increasingly prominent in health care across the world.

Palliative care associated with improved patient and caregiver outcomes in a metaanalysis of randomized clinical trials conducted by Kavalieratos, D., etal, (2016) showed that palliative care was associated with improvements in quality of life and symptom burden but not with improved survival. Hence, palliative care may be associated with improved quality of life and symptom burden for patients.

Palliative care nursing is an important domain of nursing which is a blend of hands-on skills and personal attributes bound together. Florence Nightingale herself stated: 'I use the word nursing for want of a better.' She went on to say: 'The very elements of nursing are all but unknown' (Nightingale, 1860). Further according to a well-known nursing theorist Virginia Henderson (1997): 'Nursing is primarily assisting the individual in the performance of those activities contributing to health and its recovery, or to a peaceful death.' Both the statements have imbibed in them all concepts that are central to the palliative nursing.

Meeting the physical needs like relieving common physical symptoms-pain, fatigue, anorexia, nausea, etc. Supporting the emotions and help in coping with cancer and chronic diseases. Palliative care nurses provide resources and counsel patients and families, deal with the emotions-anxiety, fear, depression, etc. Coordinating with various resources and services. Providing a moral and spiritual support as many cancer and chronic disease patients struggle to understand why cancer and chronic diseases has chosen them.

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However this is not without challenges. A number of challenges today hinder the patients suffering from cancer and chronic diseases to have access to palliative care. These include: limited availability of palliative care services, poor coordination among various specialties and disciplines, lack of communication about patient's goals and preferences, limited research evidence related to palliative care and so on. Moreover, this is not one-sided, it is definitely a challenge for the small number of healthcare professionals also to attend and provide the best possible palliative care to the huge and increasing number of patients suffering with cancer. Hence it is the need of the hour to have adequate and competent workforce esp. nurses in the field of palliative care in order to bring down the agony of such life-threatening diseases like cancer and chronic diseases



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Impact of Climate Change On Health In Yemen



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Association of Bacterial Vaginosis with Adverse Pregnancy Outcome

Abstract

Objective: To examine whether there is a relationship between bacterial Vaginosis, premature rupture of membranes (PROM) and preterm labor (PTL). **Study design:** Two hundred pregnant woman at less than 34 weeks gestation were screened for bacterial Vaginosis. The diagnosis of bacterial Vaginosis (B.V) was based on vaginal pH≥4.5 and gram stain of vaginal smears. The occurrence of (PROM) and (PTL) was recorded for each case. **Setting:** El- Minia University Hospital. **Results:** The prevalence of (B.V) among healthy pregnant woman ,women with (PROM) and those delivering prematurely was (13/125= 10.4%),(7/23=30.43%) and (14/52=26.73%) respectively. Women with bacterial Vaginosis were found to be more likely to develop PROM and preterm labor when compared to healthy pregnant woman (p-value =0.0026 and 0.0030) respectively. **Conclusion:** Bacterial Vaginosis (B.V) occurs in a significantly higher proportion of women with adverse pregnancy outcome compared to those with healthy pregnancy. Bacterial Vaginosis should be thoughtfull of when dealing with a case of adverse pregnancy outcome especially if it is of unknown origin.





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Assessment of Risk Factors for Cholera Epidemic Transmission among Females Employees at Sana'a City – Yemen – Case Control Study.

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Abstract

Background: Cholera causes an estimated 1.3–4.3 million illnesses and 30,000–140,000 deaths worldwide each year, Cholera is caused by toxigenic Vibrio cholerae serogroup O1 or O139 and is transmitted through the fecal-oral route. As such, infection is usually associated with drinking contaminated water and poor hygiene and sanitation (World Health Organization, 2017). Aim of this study: This study aimed to identify risk factors for cholera transmission in Sana'a city, Yemen. Methodology: We conducted an unmatched case-control study. Cases were identified from health unit records of Sana'a University, we interviewed 230 participants on socio-economic, household hygiene, food and water exposures practices using a semi-structured questionnaire. Data was analyzed using SPSS 22 versions, P < 0.05 was considered to be statistically significant. The results The 230 participants included 45 (19.5 %) cholera cases and 185 (80.5%) controls. Ages ranged from 15 years to 65 years; with a mean of (20.0±47.0) years. The cholera attack rate was 0.16 % with no fatality according WHO. Report 2017. Most participants 206 (89.5 %) had heard of cholera. Poor hygienic practices 199 (85.5.2 %) and contaminated water sources 159 (69.1 %) were the main reported transmission routes of cholera. Good hygienic practices 211 (91.7 %) were the main preventive methods of cholera in both cases 45 (84.6 %)] and controls 185 (89.0 %)]. Risk factors of cholera in the study population analysis showed most participants 186 (80.8 %) practiced good food preservation methods. Moreover, many 108 (46.9 %) ate outside their homes such as in restaurants. Those with cholera were 11.2 times more likely to practice poor food preservation methods than those without the disease p < 0.0001). In conclusion: The cholera transmission risk factors in Sana'a city were related to water and sanitation hygiene Moreover, it was demonstrated that not washing khat before chewing is a specific risk factor for cholera Therefore, increasing awareness of the population on the importance of water chlorination, and washing fruits, Khat and vegetables through a health education campaign is strongly recommended.

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Effect Education Program on Mother's Knowledge Toward Breastfeeding in Al-Hodieadh Governorate-Yemen 2021

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Abstract

Background: Breastfeeding is an essential and very important for public health and growth newborn. It is considered as the appropriate method feeding to provide necessary nutrition for newborn. The study aimed to: This study aimed to increase mothers' knowledge and practice about breastfeeding. Methods: The quasi-experimental research design was utilized in this study. Result: the finding this study reveal that effect of the education program on mothers' knowledge toward breastfeeding. The total sore of mothers' knowledge about breastfeeding showed that; out of 135, (8.1%) of mothers had good knowledge in pretest and their knowledge improved after implemented to be 76.3% in posttest, and 56.3% in follow up test. Conclusion: The present study findings highlighted effect of education programme on mothers' knowledge toward breastfeeding. Also, this study discovered that there is relation between the characteristic and mothers' knowledge was observed after implemented education programme. Recommendation: Yemenis' mothers need to continue education program about breastfeeding, particular the mothers who lives in rural areas.

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Effect of Teaching Program on Adherence of Healthy Lifestyle Behaviors and Clearance of Small Lower Ureteric Stone

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Abstract

Background: Urinary stone affects about 12% of the world's population and has become a worldwide health problem. Lifestyle behaviors can contribute to the risk of urinary stone formation; addressing these behaviors adequately can provide a simple and more costeffective measure for the prevention of urinary stones and the reduction of their recurrence among urinary stone patients. The current study aimed to evaluate the effect of the teaching program on adherence of healthy lifestyle behaviors and clearance of small lower ureteric stone. **Research design:** Quasi-experimental design (two groups pre-test, post-test) was used to achieve the aim of this study. Sample: A purposive sample of 60 patients was divided into two groups (30 patients in the study group and 30 patients in the control group). Tool (I): A structured interviewing questionnaire that includes part one: demographic characteristics of the patients, part two: included present medical history and previous medical history. Tool (II): Adherence of healthy lifestyle behaviors scale: it was divided into three subscales regarding consumption of restricted foods, consumption of fluids, and healthy usual self-activities. Tool (III): Patients' outcome sheet. Results: There are statistically significant differences between both groups post-teaching program regarding satisfactory adherence level of healthy lifestyle behaviors. The clearance of a small lower ureteric stone occurred in the study group more than in the control group and there was a statistically significant difference. Conclusion: The study concluded that the teaching program has a positive effect on adherence of healthy lifestyle behaviors to enhance stone clearance and prevent its recurrence. Recommendations: Creation of an educational unit for urinary tract stone patients in the nephrology and urology hospital. Conducting similar studies on a larger probability sample is recommended to achieve generalization of the findings

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Impact of Health Educational Program for Pregnant Women on their Selected Postpartum and Newborn Care

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Abstract

Background: Mother and newborns are incredibly susceptible during the post-natal period, which is also characterized by high rates of sickness and mortality. Knowledge of post-natal care plays a crucial role in preventing these problems. Aim of the study: to evaluate the impact of health educational program for pregnant women on their selected post-partum and newborn care. Research design: quasi-experimental research design (one group pre-test, post-test) was used to fulfill the aim of this study. Sample: A purposive sample composed of 70 pregnant women was used in this research. Tool of data collection: three tools were used: Tool (I): an interviewing questionnaire. Tool (II): pregnant women's knowledge about post-partum and newborn care, **Tool** (III) observational checklist regarding post-partum and newborn care. **Results:** The findings of this study revealed that (75.70%) of the studied sample had poor knowledge level before the implementation of the educational program, while (90.00 %) of the study sample had good knowledge immediately after the implementation of the educational program and slightly decreased to (85.70%) in the first day post-partum with highly statistically significant differences which P-value $\leq 0.0001**$, in addition, the results illustrated a significant improvement in total practice regarding postpartum and newborn care among pregnant women in post-test as compared to pre-test (Pvalue ≤ 0.0001). Conclusion: This study concluded that implementing the health education program effectively improved pregnant women's overall knowledge and practice towards post-partum and newborn care. **Recommendation:** Regular training programs to educate pregnant women, especially primigravida, to improve their knowledge and practice about post-partum and newborn care, which can reduce maternal and newborn morbidity and mortality.

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The Effect of Implementing Evidence Based Practices Guidelines on Women's Knowledge and Practices Regarding Self-Care after Hysterectomy

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Abstract

Introduction: Evidence-based practices guidelines for women undergoing hysterectomy are considered a strategy for promoting their health and wellbeing. Self-care is the ability of individuals, families, and communities to promote health, prevent disease, maintain health, and to cope with illness and disability with or without the support of a healthcare provider. Aim: This study aimed to evaluate the effect of implementing evidence-based practices guidelines on women's knowledge and practices regarding self-care after hysterectomy. Subjects and Methods: A Quasiexperimental (one group pre & post-test) design was utilized in this study. A purposive sample of 60 women was recruited in this study that was conducted at gynaecological departments of Minia university hospital, Egypt. The study utilized four tools, (I) Structured interview questionnaire, (II) Structured questionnaire on women's knowledge, (III) Women's self-reported practices, & (IV) Follow up questionnaire. **Results:** The study's main findings revealed that (88.30%) of women had inadequate knowledge and (98.30 %) of them had unsatisfactory practices regarding self-care after hysterectomy in the pre-test. While, after application of evidence-based practices guidelines, it was observed that there was a highly statistically significant improvement ($P \le 0.001$) in women's total knowledge and practices. The most common health problems experienced within 6 weeks after hysterectomy was night sweats & hot flashes (86.6 %). Conclusion: Implementing evidence-based practices guidelines was effective and significantly improved women's knowledge and practices regarding self-care after hysterectomy. Recommendations: Discharge planning regimen for selfcare practices after hysterectomy should be developed and implemented pre-and post-operatively to prevent complications

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Effect of implementing Triage Training Program on obstetric Nurses' Performance

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Abstract

Background: The obstetric triage nurse is often a patient's first point of contact with the birth unit. The triage unit nurse is instrumental in identifying the patient who presents with urgent or emergent conditions and preventing denial and delay in appropriate care. So the Obstetric Triage Education course is the first course addressing obstetric triage unit nursing care and is an essential component in a triage unit nurse's orientation. The aim is to assess the effect of implementing triage training on obstetric nurses' performance. Research **Design**: quasi-experimental pre/post-test design Setting: Conducted at Maternity and Child Minia University Hospital's delivery, labor, filter clinic, and highly dependent unit on. Sample: A convenient sample of all nurses (63 nurses). Tools: Two tools: the first tool consisted of two parts: (1) a self-administered questionnaire; the second part (2) assessed the obstetric nurses' knowledge regarding obstetric triage; the second tool (3) was an observational checklist to assess the nurses' practice. **Results:** findings of actually study demonstrates that no nurses had adequate knowledge pre-triage training program compared to 64.40 % of nurses had adequate knowledge post-triage training program. Additionally, 83.10 % of nurses had satisfactory level of total practice post - triage training program compared to 0% pre-triage training program. Conclusion: The level of knowledge and practice had increased after the implementation of the triage training program (p 0.001). **Recommendation**: Regular educational programs are needed for nurses to maintain and refresh their knowledge and practice regarding obstetric triage.

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Effect of Proper Enteral Feeding Technique and Abdominal Massage on Selected Gastrointestinal Complications among Stroke Patients

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Abstract

Background: Despite utilization of enteral feeding is an important determinant for stroke patients' recovery, gastrointestinal complications still may occur. The basic goals of nursing care are to prevent complications. Therefore, utilizing techniques such as abdominal massage with proper enteral feeding has been proved to improve various digestive functions. The aim of the study: To evaluate the effect of proper enteral feeding technique and abdominal massage on selected gastrointestinal complications among stroke patients. Research design: Quasi-experimental research design was utilized. Subjects: A purposive sample including (60) adult stroke patients classified equally into two equal groups study and control group (n = 30). Setting: Conducted at the Minia University Hospital's Stroke department in the Minia governorate. **Tools:** Four tools were utilized to collect data, the first tool is a structured interview assessment sheet that includes two parts (socio-demographic characteristics and medical data) the second tool includes three parts for assessing selected gastrointestinal complications. The third and fourth tools for abdominal massage and proper enteral feeding techniques. Results: The gastric residual volume difference between the study and control group subjects was statistically significant (P<0.0001) on the third-day post-intervention. The difference between the two groups regard to the distension and vomiting occurrence was statistically significant relation on the third day (P<0.01, P<0.013) respectively. Conclusion: The study findings concluded that the study group has reduced mean average of gastric residual volume, the distention, and vomiting episodes occurrence than the control group with significance on the third day. **Recommendations:** The in-service educational training program for nurses that emphasizes the purposes and benefits of proper enteral feeding technique and abdominal massage is very important.

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Effect of Implementing Educational Program on Pregnant Women's Maternal and Neonatal Outcomes Regarding Cervical Cerclage

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Abstract

Background: Cervical cerclage, as well named a cervical stitch, is a therapy for cervical ineffectiveness or deficiency, when the cervix begins to reduce and open too early throughout a gestation resulting in either late abortion or pre-term delivery. Aim of the **study**: to evaluates the effect of implementing educational program on pregnant women's maternal and neonatal outcomes regarding cervical cerclage. Research design: Quasi experimental research design was used. Setting: The study was conducted in outpatient departments at Minia university hospital for maternity and child health. Subjects: A purposive sample of (100) pregnant women under taken cervical cerclage were recruited for the current study and divided equally by using a simple random sample into intervention or study group (n=50cases) & control group (n=50cases). **Tools of data collection:** Four tools were used as follows: 1- A structured Interviewing Questionnaire, 2- knowledge Assessment tool, 3- Assessment tool for practices, 4- Assessment tool for Maternal and Neonatal outcomes. **Results** The current study reveals; that (94.0%) of the study and control groups respectively had poor knowledge regarding cervical cerclage pre-program decreased postprogram, and (2%) of study and control groups had a satisfactory level of practice regarding cervical cerclage procedure preprogram, compared to (92% & 6%) of study and control groups had a satisfactory level of practice regarding cervical cerclage procedure post program. Conclusion & Recommendations: Implementing the educational program effectively and significantly improved pregnant women's knowledge and practice regarding cervical cerclage, Should use the educational program as one of the routine hospital cares for women undergoing cervical cerclage.

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Knowledge and Attitude of Pregnant Women Regarding Danger Clinical Features of Pregnancy

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Abstract

Background: Women who are pregnant experience warning signs and symptoms known as danger clinical features. Aim: To assess knowledge and attitude of pregnant women regarding danger clinical features of pregnancy. Design of the research: the research was conducted using descriptive research design. Setting: The research was carried out at Minia maternity and children university hospital, Minia governorate, Egypt. Subjects: A representative sample from the total number of pregnant women who visit Antenatal care clinics in maternity and children university hospital monthly which constituted (306) case. Tool: Tool I: A structured interview questionnaire (Socio Demographic Data), Tool II: Structured questionnaire on women's knowledge regarding danger clinical features of pregnancy, Tool III: Structured questionnaire on women's attitude toward danger clinical features during pregnancy (Likert scale). Results: pregnant women had low level of knowledge regarding danger clinical features with (56.5%). The highest percentage regarding pregnant women knowledge about danger clinical features was for items "sudden gush of fluid before labor, loss of fetal movement, vaginal bleeding, oliguria/anuria, premature onset of contraction & severe headache" with (62.7%, 42.5%, 40.5%, 38.6%, 34.6%, &32.7% consequently). Pregnant women had positive attitude toward danger clinical features with (89.5%). Conclusion: There was highly statistical significant relationship between pregnant women's knowledge level and their attitude toward danger clinical features of pregnancy. Recommendations: Establishing antenatal programs to educate all expectant mothers about the clinical dangers of pregnancy and when it is best to see a doctor.

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The Relation Between Job Attitude and Organizational Citizenship Behavior among Staff Nurses in Health Insurance Hospital

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Abstract

Background: Enhancing nurses' job attitude in the organization could be achieved through Organizational Citizenship Behavior, better the performance of employees, job satisfaction and organizational productivity. The study aimed to: assess the relation between job attitude and organizational citizenship behavior among staff nurses in Health Insurance Hospital. Research design: A descriptive correlational research design. Sample: consisted of all available staff nurses (196 nurses) working in Health Insurance Hospital during data collection. Setting: conducted at Health Insurance Hospital, Minia City. Tools of data collection: two tools were used, tool I: job attitude scale and tool II: organizational citizenship scale were used. **Results:** the findings of the current study reveals that (68.4%) of staff nurses have positive job attitude while (31.6%) of them have negative job attitudes. Also (60.7%) of staff nurses have moderate level, followed by (39.3%) from them have high level of the total organizational citizenship behavior. Conclusion: there were a positive attitude organizational citizenship correlation between iob and behavior. **Recommendations:** Conduct an educational program for all levels of nurses about the organizational citizenship behavior to spread this behavior among them.

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Impact of Using Social Networking as Learning Aid on Nursing Students Academic Engagement and Achievement

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Abstract

Background: Social networking sites are an integrated component of the lives of many students, these sites have various effects on their lifestyles, especially in their academic engagement and achievement; and it encourages students to actively engage with group work. The aim of the study is to assess the impact of using social networking as learning aid on nursing students' academic engagement and achievement. Research design: a descriptive cross-sectional research design was utilized. Subjects: consisted of a representative sample (30%) of the total number of undergraduate nursing students from the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th academic years (no. =840). **Setting**: The study was conducted at the faculty of nursing at Minia University, Egypt. Data collection: two tools included as following: "Social networking questionnaire", and "Student academic engagement questionnaire". Results: showed that the majority (91.50%) of nursing students had a moderate level regarding social networking sites usage, more than two-thirds (67%) of them had a moderate level of student academic engagement, and more than half (51.80%) of them had very good degrees regarding student's academic achievement. Conclusion: there was a highly statistically significant correlation between SNSs usage and students' academic engagement, while there was no statistically significant correlation between students' achievement with SNSs usage and students' academic Recommendation: Encourage students to use social networking sites appropriately to help them improve their academic engagement and achievement.

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Nursing Staff' Knowledge, Attitudes, and Selected Psychological Response Regarding COVID-19 Outbreak

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Abstract

Background: COVID-19 is an ongoing pandemic, for which appropriate infection prevention and control measures need to be adopted. Healthcare workers' adherence to prevention and control measures is affected by their knowledge, attitudes, and anxiety or fear level towards COVID-19. Aim of the study: is to assess nursing staff knowledge, attitude, and psychological response of COVID-19 during COVID-19 outbreak. Research design: a descriptive correlational research design. Setting: conducted at the Minia Health Insurance Hospital. Subjects: all nursing staff at the time of data collection (no=280). Data collection tools: data was collected by using four tools. Results: the study showed that majority (97.1%) of nursing staff had satisfied total knowledge about COVID-19; the majority (87.5%) of nursing staff had a favorable attitude toward COVID-19; more than half that (53.6%) of nursing staff had a moderate level of fear from COVID-19 and finally, more than half (51.8%) of nursing staff had a moderate level of total anxiety from COVID-19. **Conclusion**: it was observed that there was a weak positive association between total nursing staff knowledge about COVID-19 and their total attitude toward COVID-19. While, there was a weak negative association between nursing staff knowledge about COVID-19 and their total fear score; and there was a negative but not significant association between knowledge about COVID-19 and their total anxiety score. **Recommendation:** All nurses should have access to personal protective equipment at all times, especially those working in isolation hospitals, and there should be training sessions provided on COVID-19 protection

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Problem-Based Learning and Nurse Education: A review of the evidence

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Abstract

Background: Problem-Based Learning (PBL) is a teaching method in which complex real-world problems are used as the vehicle to promote student learning of concepts and principles as opposed to direct presentation of facts and concepts. In addition to course content, PBL can promote the development of critical thinking skills, problem-solving abilities, and communication skills. It can also provide opportunities for working in groups. **Objective:** Our objective of this report was to critically review and summarize the published literature on PBL, with the main focus on studies to expand the knowledge base and debate surrounding PBL, and to highlight the significant contribution that nurse's student can make to improving patient outcomes in practice and define strategies for disseminating evidence. Methods: A systematic review of the national and international literature on EBP and strategies disseminating and Several barriers to implementing evidence-based practice. Conclusion and recommendation: PBL are a student-centered approach to curriculum, where clinical case presentations are the stimulus for acquiring the basic science knowledge needed to understand underlying mechanisms, as well as means of developing clinical reasoning skills. Also help students actively participate in tutorials. Equally important as utilizing evidence as the foundation of quality patient care is the conduct of research to fill the gaps in existing nursing literature for improving clinical practice. Therefore, conducting research can provide the necessary evidence on which to base nursing practice within the healthcare facility and routine PBL educational and skills building sessions must be incorporated into curriculum and continuing education offerings.
